

# Naturalization Records

Naturalization is the process by which an alien becomes an American citizen. Depending on the time period, the records that documented this process can provide a researcher with a person's birth date and place of birth, occupation, immigration year, marital status, information on spouse and children, and more. A naturalization record can include a certificate of arrival, declaration of intention, and petition for naturalization.

The National Archives at New York City has dexigraph copies of naturalization records prior to 1907 for all courts in New York City. After this date we only hold original naturalization records from the Federal District Courts in New York, New Jersey, and Puerto Rico. Naturalizations were also processed in local courts for certain time periods in many areas including New York and New Jersey. Except for our pre-1907 New York City dexigraph collection, the National Archives does not have access to these local court records.

Many naturalization records have been digitized and can be located online. If a New York or New Jersey naturalization record that was issued through a Federal District Court is not available through our online resources or our microfilm collection we can furnish you with a copy of the original document, as long as the declaration or petition number is known or can be located through our available indexes.

If the record you need is not available online or on microfilm you will need a researcher card to request a copy of the original record. Inquire at the research room desk to apply for a researcher card. If you need a certified copy of a naturalization record, you must first locate the record citation in the indexes, and the copy of the record must be made by a staff member from the microfilm or from the original documents if a copy is not available on microfilm. Certified copies of records are normally requested for specific legal reasons.
