GENEALOGY: FREE OR FEE?

Have a strategy for your research so you pay only for what you need:

- 1. Who are you researching?
 - **Direct line** is a priority for obtaining records.
 - **Brick walls** may be a priority for obtaining records.
- 2. What records/info do you have? Take inventory!
 - Birth, marriage, death records
 - Naturalization
 - Military
 - Other records (obits, wedding announcements, etc.)
- 3. What do you need?
 - Do you need an actual record (for lineage society or gen proof)?
 - Do you just need the information?
 - Unique/first-hand documents are a priority
- 4. What are your constraints?
 - Money
 - Distance
 - Time
