- Genealogical instruction
- Resources
- Family history context
- Connections

Evaluating Genealogical Data

Original source:

A document containing information in its first recorded form

Derivative source:

A document whose information was taken from (transcribed, extracted, or abstracted from) another source

Why are derivative sources inferior?

- They're inaccurate
- They're incomplete
- They don't provide the information needed to evaluate their reliability (They're taken out of context.)
