Family Search Project
Our Board of Directors on April 9, 1994, approved an offer to the
Darien Library requesting their acquisition of the Family Search
Data Base available by The Church of Latter Day Saints.
Description of this Data Base is included with this news letter.

We expect to help pay for this investment and we offered to help the Library defray a portion of the expense.

Our Board of Directors proposed that on the understanding that the total first year expenditure for both software and hardware would be approximately \$4500, we would be prepared to contribute \$1000 up front, with a further target of \$1000 to contribute from our efforts at fund raising. This money to be put towards the purchase of a set of 42 compact disks and caddies. Additionally, we would, subject to approval of the MGS Board, provide \$200 each year towards the annual re-licensing fee which we understand would cover the annual update of the Ancestral File, but not the less frequently updated I.G.I.

We have been informed that the Darien Library Board <u>has</u> approved our offer and some of the material has already been ordered and received.

We owe a great deal of gratitude to the Director, Mrs. Louise Berry and her assistant Valerie Fredericks. Their whole hearted cooperation with our society is most gratifying.

We hope the Workstation will be available in the Library Research Room where our M.G.S. resource files are located within weeks for use by the general public.

The Family Search Project was spearheaded by two of our members; Richard Saar and David Bowley to whom we wish to thank for their diligence.

COMPUTER CORNER by David Bowley

of the world day Every genealogical data access expanding. Dick Saar gave me a piece from the Clark County Gen. Society WA which contained an article on an Electronic Bulletin Board which has just been started by the American Gen. Lending Library (AGGL) in Bountiful Utah. I dialled up their number (801)299-0087 on my computer & was able to watch a free 5 minute demo on the services that they offer. These include the ability to search for names in the Social Security Index, the Canadian Catalog, Deaths Census Marriages, etc.

Files can also be downloaded. A number of forums have been set up for electronic discussions

on genealogy in specific areas such as New England. The service is relatively expensive at \$15 per month, but I will try it and report back if it seems to be worth while.

For those interested in joining the Internet, which is a loosely knit network Computers on a world wide basis, the best thing to do is get one of the coupons which appear in the Science section of the Tuesday New York Times advertising DELPHI. The coupons gives you 5 free hours on the DELPHI system through which you can get FULL access to the Internet, as opposed electronic messaging only which the competing of several PRODIGY services, such as offer.

I also use COMPUSERVE which is worldside; and last week saw a message from a Patrick Black in Barrow-in-Furness Cumbria U.K. This was on the Compuserve Gen. Bulletin Board & talking about getting U.K. telephone numbers for someone in this country. As my primary area of research is Cumbria (The English Lake District) I asked him to look jup Harrison (my paternal Grand-mother's maiden name in the Cockermouth area telephone book. He came back with a message indicating that there were 16 Harrison for that area & this week I got a copy of 3 pages of Harrisons from the whole North-West section of England by mail, which typical of how helpful people are on the electronic Bulletin Boards!

In case you are wondering how I can afford all these services... I got a new Compaq Presario 633 computer in November and along with it came

a bunch of freebies. I tried to cancel Compuserve & found that they have a special rate of \$2.50 per month where you just pay for the time you use. Incidentally if anyone is considering Compuserve & has windows, I can highly recommend an inexpensive program called WinCIM which is a Compuserve Information Manager for Windows which makes access to & navigation around Compuserve so much easier. See you in Cyperspace! DB

LIBRARY NEWS By C.Scribner.

Among the many fine books in our section of the Darien Library are the yearly volumes of the New England Historical and Genealogical Society Register and the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society record. The wide range of genealogical and related subjects contained in these collections make them a must for genealogical libraries.

The NEHG Register books in our possesion are complete to Oct 1993, volume 147. Each yearly volume consists of 4 quarterly issues (Jan.-Apr.-Jul.-Oct.). All issues have a table of contents. The fourth issue (Oct.) includes indexes of contents and name for yearly volumes. Volume 1 thru 80 are on micro-film in the newspaper reference room complete with indexes. We have a cumulative subject index for volumes 51 to 142 located on shelf 2.4 in our section of the library. A new subject index for volumes 51 to 145 is being published and should be in print by mid 1994.

The NYGLB Record books are also printed in yearly volumes with 4 quarterly issues, same months. Like the Register, indexes of subjects and names are also found in the fourth (Oct.) issue of each yearly volume. We have complete volumes and indexes through Volume 122 (1991). Volumes 123(1992) and 124(1993) are incomplete. There are 3 issues missing from each volume. We hope to bring these volumes up to date in the near future. The NYGLB Record does not have a Master Index in print; however, they are in the process of publishing on which should be in print within the next year os so. A Master Index, compiled by Jean Worden of New York State Research Books, is in our possesion and covers up to Volume 113(1982).

FAMILY CALENDAR

Are you looking for another way to use the information that has been so diligently amassed? The information on births & marriages for your family, especially the living members, is filed away in your records. This information is exclusively for your use as other family members know nothing of it. Even if they do have knowledge of its availability, they do not have ready access to it throughout the year. It doesn't have to be that way and I think that many of us would like to share the information. That is, without going to the BIG process of a publication and all the problems that would entail.

This can be done by creating a Family Calendar. The family calendar does many things for the owner besides having another place to determine the day of the week or month of the year. As the present day passes over a birthday or an anniversary date the family calendar may prompt one to send a card making another person feel less forgotten. Obviously it will take away the biggest excuse of all... I forgot! A card may may not be sent but the recollection of a distant cousin or an elderly aunt will make the family seem a little closer.Perhaps memories of a childhood reunion or a Christmas party may come to mind when a long forgotten name is recalled. It can serve as a point of reference when someones age is questioned or when a marriage took place and who was their spouse. The calendar will not be obsolete when the present year is history, and can be used to chronicle future events as they happen.

The proces of making the calendar is quite easy. The first obvious point is collecting the information. The names to be include depend on who will receive the finished calendar if siblings are included with you and your family you would probably want their children to be included also. The calendar makes a nice gift and the year can start whenever you choose. To collect the information required may take some time but get started NOW with mail, phone or perhaps a visit!

The second step is formatting the calendar which can

be done either by hand or by computer; in either or it can be personalized to your own style and make attractive to the viewer.

Handmade calendars are easier to personalize than those made on a computer. Start with a simple ready-made calendar that allows writing space for each day. Pull the calendar apart so that each month is a on a separate page. Insert it, one page at a time, into the typewriter and begin adding the information. The overflow days can be added above or below the main calendar or on adjacent days. Those few people who are calligraphers can use freehand and really make a masterpiece for posterity!

If you choose to use a computer, you will find software which has calendar programs which allow many variations in font, style, graphics along with shading, boxing, scrolls and banners to customize each event or date. The various holidays, moon-phases, and items such as days of the year gone/to go can also be added. The problem of having too many events falling on any particular date can be solved by putting them on the preceeding day, with a n indicating, for instance that "tomorrow is the birthday of" A local copying company can provide many choices of colored paper on which the finished calendar can be printed and collated for a reasonable price. The final step will be for you to staple, bind or punch holes for twine with which the calendars can be hung.

The finished calendar is your way of making fuller use of the information which you have collected and letting more of your family benefit from it. It will surely generate feedback and give you more information on future family happenings. It might even become a conversation piece and generate a family gathering. Try it I am sure that you will find that the effort expended will be rewarding!

Because Plorence Wyland is always so knowledgeable and helpful at our Genealogy Board Meetings, interviewing her for a member profile seemed a natural progression.

Toward this goal, I traveled to her home in Wilton one night last week. Off the road, nestled on a hillside, complete with an ancient bank barn/cold storage cellar (currently used for storage,) is Florence's new modern home. Immediately inside the front door is Florence and husband Al's Family Tree Wall Hanging. What an intriguing pedigree! Florence traces herself back to John Alden and Priscilla Mullins and belongs to the Mayflower Society, while Al's family, the Chambers, were founders of Chambersburg, Penn.

Florence explained how she got started in her genealogical quest twenty years ago, researching in both Pennsylvania and New England. Her son Clifford wanted some information about the Bates family of Scarsdale, New York. He got out a large piece of poster board and drew a little box and wrote her name in it. "That box got me interested and challenged." She started adding boxes and putting names of the parents, grandparents and this led

to the search for all the ancestors. Florence's original box has grown to an astonishing well organized collection of maps, Bibles, primary sources, land and court records, wills and deeds - which now fill eight file drawers.

Florence's second "cousin," Delhia Wheeler of North Stonington, Ct, now deceased, had previously proven the Alden connection. The old Bates Family Bible went back to 1781 with names like Cornell, Valentine, Pinckney, Mott, families of Eastchester and Scarsdale, New York and are all interrelated with Florence's Bates ancestors. Florence discovered pictures of her early Bates relatives when she made a research trip to the basement of the Scarsdale Public Library. The family owned a 200 acre farm there, with a marble quarry on the property. Some of this marble was used to build the New York City Hall in part, and the A. T. Stewart building in entirety. The photos show the quarry as well as the 1762 house and the workers living quarters. Alfred S. Bates and wife Lucy Whitney, raised 10 children and were totally self sufficient living off this property. Both were killed together in their 70's, in a horse and buggy accident at the railroad crossing in Scarsdale and are buried in The St. James The Less church cemetery. In 1864, a branch of this Bates family moved to Raymond Street in Darien, Ct. Florence recently returned to the Homestead to visit.

Since Alan's grandmother, who lived to 95 years of age, lived with Florence and Al in her later years, they heard first hand stories about the Civil War. George Wyland served at Chancellorsville, Manassas etc., as an artilleryman. His brother, Lewis Wyland served in Pennsylvania and was wounded near Poplar Grove Church, Virginia, and died January 6, 1863 in Campbell Hospital, Washington DC, of his wounds, at age 20. He is buried in the Soldiers' Home National Cemetery in

Washington, DC, the first cemetery for Civil War soldier before Arlington Cemetery was created.


Another branch of her family is the Coates of New England. Robert Coates the immigrant, settled in 1638 at Nahant, Essex County, Massachusetts. This family later moved to North Stonington, Connecticut, and Florence found the old Coats Cemetery there, almost buried in bushes and trees. David Coats, who died 1853, aged 87 years, was a prominent citizen, being keeper of the Town's records. His leather bound diary is in the possession of the North Stonington Historical Society, with names, dates, births, marriages, deaths, political happenings, etc, of the Town, all written in a very fine brown ink handwriting from cover to cover. This valuable document is kept for safe keeping in the Town Hall vault.

Florence was born and raised in Darien, Connecticut. She started her education at the Holmes School in Darien, and continued through the Hollow Tree Junior High and the Durien High School, now turned into the Darien Town Hall. She attended Central Connecticut State College. She is married to George Alan Wyland and they have four children and seven grandchildren. Florence is now Executive Secretary for the J. M. Layton & Company Insurance Agency in Norwalk, and was previously secretary at the United Church in Rowayton, O for fourteen years. Nicki Hollander, former President of the Middlesex Genealogy Society, lived next door to the church. and would often stop in the office and talk their favorite subje 'genealogy,' joined in by The Rev. Donald Emig. Between encouragement from Nicki and Don and help from Marianne Sheldon in finding records in Rhode Island, her drive and perseverance are paying off in a fascinating info-collection of ancestors.

Florence belongs to the New England Genealogical and Biographical Society; Mayflower Society; The Bates Association in Scituate MA; Pequot Library; Centre County PA Genealogical Society and The Loyalists Gazette.
